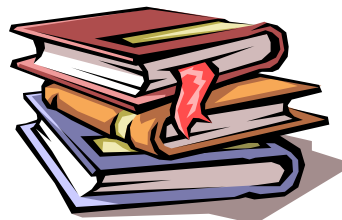

Study Skills 101:

Talking to your professor

Conversing with your professor is an essential part of any course. Besides getting help, you are letting him/her know that you are interested in the course. Remember, your professor is there to help you—not just torture you with problem sets.

1. Go to office hours! If you have a question, going to your professor is the best way to get the answer. Check the syllabus for office hours and location.
2. If you are too shy to go to office hours, talk to your professor after class or send an e-mail. Professors are generally fantastic at getting back to students' questions quickly.
3. Find out if your professor has a screen name. Often, professors have screen names so that they can answer students' questions online.
4. Plan out your questions ahead of time. It shows that you are organized and care about the course.
