President Joan Hinde Stewart

Joan Hinde Stewart assumed the Hamilton presidency on July 1, 2003. She was formerly dean of the College of Liberal Arts and professor of French at the University of South Carolina (USC). The first in her family to earn a college degree, Stewart also joined the Hamilton faculty as professor of French. She is

the first female president in Hamilton's more-than-190-year history.

Prior to her arrival at USC in 1999, Stewart was at North Carolina State University as a member of the faculty from 1973 to 1999 and chair of the Department of Foreign Languages and Literatures from 1985 to 1997. She also served as assistant dean for research and graduate programs for the College of Humanities and Social Sciences. In 1988-89, Stewart chaired the North Carolina Humanities Council, and in 1977 she received the university's Outstanding Teaching Award.

Before joining the NC State faculty, Stewart taught at Wellesley College. She received her Ph.D. from Yale

University in 1970, having graduated *summa cum laude* in 1965 from St. Joseph's College, a small, private, liberal arts institution in Brooklyn, New York.

Stewart's scholarship focuses on 18th-century French literature, especially women writers. She has written several books and numerous articles, essays and book reviews, and has been a frequent speaker at professional conferences both in the United States and abroad. She is the recipient of fellowships from Yale University, the National Humanities Center and the National Endowment for the Humanities, and has been a fellow at the Université Paul Valéry in Montpellier, France, a visiting scholar at Oxford University in England, and a fellow at the Liguria Study Center for the Arts and Letters in Genoa, Italy.

Hamilton's 19th president is married to Philip Stewart, the Benjamin E. Powell Professor of Romance Studies at Duke University. He has served as chair of romance studies and of Duke's Academic Council, and is the former president of the American Association of Teachers of French. The Stewarts have a daughter, who is a graduate of Haverford College and has a Ph.D. in German at Indiana University in Bloomington, and a son, who is a graduate of Prescott College in Arizona.



Jon Hind Director of Athletics

Jon Hind '80 is in his fifth year as director of athletics at Hamilton College. Hind graduated from Hamilton with a bachelor's degree in mathematics and economics.

Hind previously was associate athletic director for operations at Butler University. He worked in Butler athletics since 1991. He was

Butler's first head men's lacrosse coach. Hind was named National Coach of the Year by the U.S. Intercollegiate Lacrosse Association after he guided the Bulldogs to the NCAA championships tournament in 1998.

Hind left coaching to become an athletic administrator at Butler in the fall of 1999. He assumed management responsibilities in marketing and promotions in July 2005, while continuing to oversee the department's event management, facilities and budget. Hind was Butler's interim athletic director from May through August in 2006.

Hind was head men's lacrosse coach at the College of Wooster from 1986 to 1991. He played lacrosse and football at Hamilton. He was a four-year letter winner and two-time captain as a defenseman on the lacrosse team, and lettered in football as a sophomore. Hind earned a master's degree in athletic administration from Kent State University in 1991. Hind and his wife, Carol, are the parents of two daughters, Kayleigh and Meghan.



Kerri Fagan Associate Director of Athletics/SWA

Kerri Fagan is in her second year as the associate director of athletics at Hamilton College. Fagan had been the senior associate commissioner of the America East Conference since 2008. She directed the overall administration of 20 America East Conference sports and their championships.

Before joining America East, Fagan spent seven years with the NCAA. She was an associate director of championships from 2002 to 2008, and during that time she administered and managed four NCAA championships, including Division III field hockey and Division III women's ice hockey. She served as a liaison to the Division III championships committee and was a member of the Division III governance team. From 2001 to 2002 she was an assistant director of championships for the NCAA, and she was responsible for six championships during that one season.

Fagan was the assistant director of athletics/senior woman administrator at Indiana State University from 1997 to 2001. She administered all aspects of event/facility management for 15 intercollegiate sports.

Fagan is a member of the National Association of Collegiate Women's Athletics Administrators. She played varsity field hockey at the University of Massachusetts in Amherst and graduated with a bachelor's degree in sport management in 1992. She earned her master's degree in sport administration from the University of Wisconsin-La Crosse in 1995. She is from Burrillville, R.I.

About the College

Located in the foothills of the majestic Adirondack Mountains, the Hamilton campus is set on a hilltop that overlooks the Oriskany and Mohawk valleys of Central New York. The surroundings are rural and lush, consisting of rolling terrain, gentle hills, wooded glens, dairy farms, fine old houses and tree-lined streets. Yet Hamilton's location puts it within easy range of New York, Toronto, Boston and other major northern metropolitan centers.

The College, chartered in 1812, is coeducational with approximately 1,800 students. Its strength lies in highly regarded academic programs administered by a deeply committed faculty who welcome close collaboration with students. Fundamental to a Hamilton education is the faculty's expectation that each student develops the ability to read, observe and listen with critical perception, and to think, write and speak with clarity, understanding and precision.

Hamilton graduates can be found making important contributions in nearly every professional field, and because of the College's educational contributions to their success, alumni remain enthusiastically loyal to and supportive of the College.

As reflected in applications for admission, Hamilton is considered one of the most selective liberal arts colleges in the country. And, because of the large number of applications that the College receives each year, the student body is unusually diverse. Students come to Hamilton from all parts of the United States — indeed, from all parts of the globe. In such an environment, students learn to appreciate differences and prepare for life in an increasingly global society.

In evaluating prospective students, the admission committee looks for academic achievement as well as personal accomplishments outside the classroom. Thus, both the athlete who excels on the playing field and the musician who participates in a community ensemble have the talents the College is seeking.



Coaching Staff



Kate DeSorrento
Head Coach

Kate DeSorrento is in her first season as the head women's basketball coach at Hamilton College. DeSorrento had been the top assistant coach at the University of Rochester since 2008. She is the eighth coach since the program's first varsity season in 1978-79.

At Rochester, DeSorrento helped guide the Yellowjackets to a 68-18 record and three NCAA Division III championship appearances in three seasons. Rochester advanced to the national semifinals in 2010. She mentored 11 University Athletic Association all-conference honorees and a two-time honorable mention All-American.

DeSorrento played at Union College from 2002 to 2005, and was a starting guard and team captain for the Dutchwomen. She helped Union to a 65-18 record and three Liberty League championship berths. The best season was 2003-04, when the Dutchwomen went 24-4, captured the league title and played in the NCAA championship for the first time in program history.

DeSorrento did not play her senior year due to health problems, and instead served as a student-assistant coach. Union played in the 2006 Liberty League championship semifinals and the Eastern College Athletic Conference Upstate title game with DeSorrento on the bench.

In high school at Catholic Central of Troy, N.Y., DeSorrento scored more than 1,400 points as a starting guard/forward and team captain from 2000 to 2002. She led the team to a Class AA state championship, two conference titles and a pair of Section II finals.

DeSorrento received a bachelor's degree in neuroscience with a history minor from Union in 2006. She will complete her master's in public health from the University of Rochester School of Medicine & Dentistry in spring 2012.



Ben Kozik
Assistant Coach

Ben Kozik is in his first year as an assistant women's basketball coach at Hamilton College. Kozik's duties include opponent scouting, film exchange and recruiting. He is a member of the Women's Basketball Coaches Association.

Kozik began his basketball coaching career at Southern Vermont College in January 2008, when he took over as head coach of a program that was winless at the time. Kozik's presence was felt immediately, as the team won its next two games. Southern Vermont scored 60 or more points five times in its final 11 games, a feat that had not been achieved before Kozik became head coach.

In 2008-2009, Kozik led Southern Vermont to the program's most wins in a decade. The team improved in several statistical categories from the year before including wins, points per game, field goal percentage, 3-point field goal percentage, free throw percentage, rebounds per game, assists per game, assist/turnover ratio and steals per game.

Kozik coached the Association of Division III Independents (AD3I) rookie of the year and two all-AD3I selections in 2007-2008. Kozik mentored one New England Collegiate Conference all-conference selection, and recruited the leading freshman scorer out of all NCAA divisions in 2008-09.

Kozik was also director of athletics at Southern Vermont. He has been an assistant football coach at Hamilton since 2010. Kozik graduated cum laude from Syracuse's Newhouse School of Public Communications with a bachelor's degree in broadcast journalism in 2001. He earned his master's degree from Syracuse in business administration in 2007.

Program Overview

The Hamilton College women's basketball team will adjust to a new conference and a new head coach in 2011-12. Since 1995-96, Hamilton had been a member of the Liberty League. But this season, the Continentals join 10 other schools in the New England Small College Athletic Conference (NESCAC). Kate DeSorrento, who was the top assistant at the University of Rochester the past three seasons, steps into her first head coaching job at Hamilton. DeSorrento inherits a team that posted a 9-14 record last season. **Madie Harlem '13** and **Eliza Howe '13** made the 2011 all-league team. The Continentals led the league in scoring defense, field goal percentage and field goal percentage defense.

The NESCAC is one of the top athletic conferences in NCAA Division III, and women's basketball is no exception. Four NESCAC teams played in the 2011 NCAA championship and one of them won the national title. One NESCAC team was a national runner-up in 2004. Three teams are ranked in the preseason Top 25 coaches poll, including the preseason No. 1. The conference tournament champion receives an automatic bid to the NCAA championship.

Harlem was ranked in the top 10 in the Liberty League in three categories last season. The 5-foot, 7-inch guard ranked 10th with 12.5 points per game, third with 2.39 steals per game and fourth with 3.6 assists per game. Howe finished seventh with a 3-point field goal percentage of 34.8 percent, and averaged 11 points per game. **Claire Hunsinger '13** ended up sixth with 1.04 blocked shots per game.

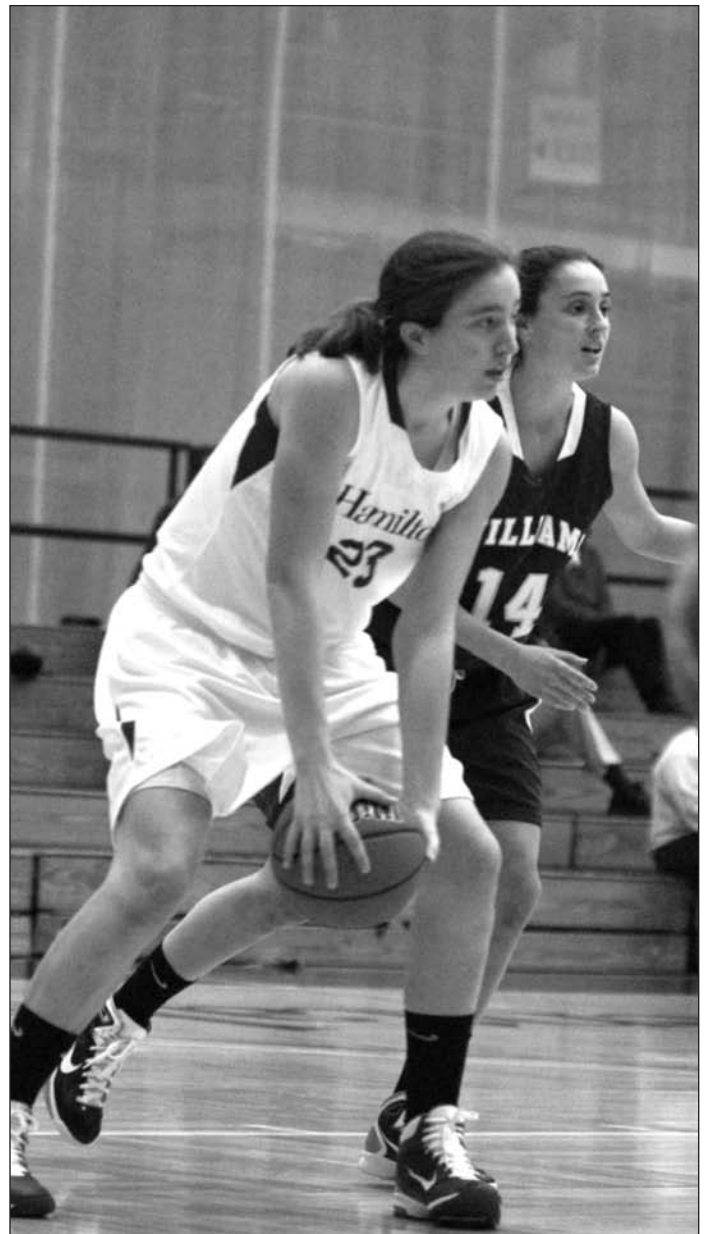
The Continentals finished 2009-10 with a winning record for the seventh time in the last eight seasons, and played in the 2010 Liberty League championship semifinals. Hamilton won seven of its last 10 regular season games and ended up with an overall record of 15-10. The Continentals placed fourth in the league standings with an 8-6 record. Harlem was named rookie of the year by the league and by D3hoops.com for the East Region. She made the all-league second team, and ranked in the top 15 in the league in seven major categories. In an early-season win against Lehman College, she tied a team record with seven field goals from beyond the arc.

Hamilton won 20 games, captured its first league tournament title and advanced to the second round of the NCAA championship in 2006-07. That team owns program records for most three-point field goals made (157) and attempted (457). The Continentals posted an overall record of 15-10 in 2007-08, and set a program record with 10 league wins en route to a third-place finish in the league standings. Hamilton played a brutal schedule with 15 games away from home and a total of 10 contests against seven teams that went on to play in the NCAA tournament. The Continentals' regular season strength of schedule was ranked 21st in all of Division III. Hamilton set a team record for highest free throw percentage at .717.

Women's basketball became a varsity sport at the College in 1978. The win at Vassar College on Feb. 19, 2010, was the 400th in program history. Some talented players

have been a part of some great teams during the past 30 seasons. Julie Diehl '93 and Melissa Hart '89 were All-America selections in 1993 and 1989, respectively. Diehl played on three teams that won 21 or more games from 1990 to 1993. The 22 victories the Continentals posted in 1990-91 are still a program record. Hamilton has made 12 postseason appearances. Don Crist's teams won almost 57 percent of their games from 1985 to 1998. Crist finished his head coaching career with 176 victories.

Kim Goidell '13, Lisa Olszewski '11 and Hunsinger made the 2010-11 Liberty League women's basketball all-academic team. Hamilton's schedule is highlighted by an early-season tournament at Buffalo State College, and two games in Daytona Beach, Fla., as part of the Land of Magic Classic in late December. The home opener is Nov. 21 against Skidmore College. The first NESCAC game at home is Jan. 6 against Bowdoin College. The Continentals play at 2,000-seat Margaret Bundy Scott Field House.

Athletic Facilities



Consistent with the classrooms, laboratories, libraries, studios and other facilities that support the academic program, Hamilton College's athletic facilities are exceptional by nearly any measure. The diversity and quality of these facilities emphasize the school's commitment to the development of both the mind and the body.

The Margaret Bundy Scott Field House, a 55,000-square-foot multipurpose athletic structure, contains three regulation-size basketball/volleyball courts and seats 2,200 spectators. The field house has hosted a number of NCAA Division III men's basketball tournament games and five Liberty League men's basketball championships. The field house houses a newly resurfaced six-lane, 200-meter running track and indoor courts for tennis, handball and racquetball. The playing surface can accommodate practice for outdoor varsity sports during inclement weather, and there are nets that drop down for golf and batting practice. The field house was dedicated on Nov. 30, 1984, and was named after the daughter of Harlow Bundy, Class of 1877.

Outdoor facilities on campus include Steuben Field for football and lacrosse; the natural grass William D. Love Field used for men's and women's soccer; the Walter H. Pritchard Track; the artificial turf Campus Road Athletic Field for field hockey; the Royce Baseball Field; the Ferguson Intramural Softball Field and the well-maintained, nine-hole Tompkins Golf Course. The Russell Sage Rink, the William M.

Bristol, Jr. Pool and the Little Squash Center are the indoor facilities. The \$6.1 million squash facility opened in October of 2006 with 10 regulation-size courts, including two with exhibition gallery seating.

The Charlean and Wayland Blood Fitness and Dance Center opened in October of 2006. The center houses a juice bar, dance studio, room for aerobic/cardio training, space for resistance and weight-training, a multipurpose exercise room and a three-story climbing wall. The state-of-the-art facility triples the current space for fitness activities on a campus where approximately 75 percent of the student body -- and many members of the faculty and staff -- work out regularly.

The Blood Fitness and Dance Center is a 30,000 square-foot facility with 9,600 square feet used for fitness and weightlifting. Precor cardio equipment is featured in the fitness area. The equipment includes elliptical machines, treadmills and stationary bicycles. The weight training equipment is by Cybex and includes power lift, hammer strength and positrac.

Sports Medicine at Hamilton College

The sports medicine staff provides excellent medical care for all Hamilton College athletes. The fully-equipped sports medicine clinic is located in Margaret Bundy Scott Field House and is convenient to all team locker rooms. The clinic moved to a 3,400 square-foot, \$1 million renovated area in September of 2006. The new clinic is four times larger than the old space and features a state-of-the-art rehabilitation center.

The program is under the direction of head certified athletic trainer **Scott Siddon**. Siddon is in his 16th year at Hamilton. He graduated with a bachelor's degree from SUNY Cortland in 1992. Siddon went on to earn his master's from the University of Oregon in 1994.

Assistant certified athletic trainer **Pat Giruzzi** is in his 13th year on the staff. Giruzzi received his bachelor's degree from Elmira College in 1998. Pat became a Registered Orthopedic Technologist (ROT) in 2007.

Stephanie Kowell is in her first year as an assistant at Hamilton, and has been a certified athletic trainer since 2008. Kowell received her bachelor's degree in physical education with an emphasis in athletic training from SUNY Brockport in 2008, and earned her master's in education from Old Dominion University in 2010. She has recently worked at Fairleigh Dickinson University, and hails from the Syracuse area.

Kara McKeag is in her first year on Hamilton's training staff. McKeag received a bachelor's degree in athletic training from Springfield College in 2009 and her master's from East Stroudsburg University. She has athletic training experience at Lehigh University and recently ended an internship at The Ohio State University.

In addition to the full-time training staff, a dedicated group of student first responders assist in the daily operations of the athletic training facility. The sports medicine clinic is open from noon to 8 p.m. and other times by appointment on weekdays, and opens according to game and practice schedules on weekends.

About the NESCAC

Founded in 1971, the New England Small College Athletic Conference (NESCAC) is a group of eleven highly selective liberal arts colleges and universities that share a similar philosophy for intercollegiate athletics. The Conference was created out of a concern for the direction of intercollegiate athletic programs, and remains committed to keeping a proper perspective on the role of sport in higher education.

The formation of NESCAC originated with an agreement among Amherst College, Bowdoin College, Wesleyan University and Williams College first drafted in 1955. Along with these four institutions, Bates College, Colby College, Hamilton College, Middlebury College, Trinity College and Tufts University are sustaining charter members. Connecticut College joined in 1982, bringing the Conference's membership to its current total of 11 institutions.

NESCAC members believe intercollegiate athletic programs should operate in harmony with the educational mission of each institution. The Conference is committed to establishing common boundaries to keep athletics strong but in proportion to the overall academic mission of the member institutions. In pursuit of this mission, the Presidents of each NESCAC institution control intercollegiate athletic policy. Conference tenets are usually more restrictive than those of the NCAA Division III with regard to season length, number of contests and post-season competition.

NESCAC institutions also believe athletic teams should be representative of the entire student body. Thus, admissions and financial policies are consistent with the NCAA Division III policies that prohibit athletic scholarships and award financial aid solely on the basis of need.

In 1999, the NESCAC formally became a playing conference and now sponsors 26 conference championship sports (13 for men and 13 for women). Member schools offer extensive and broad based intercollegiate as well as club and intramural opportunities for both men and women. With member institutions sponsoring an average of nearly 30 varsity programs, NESCAC provides more than 7,500 opportunities for participation in intercollegiate competition at the Division III level. Teams and individuals have achieved great success on both a regional and national level. During the 2010-11 academic year, 49 teams participated in NCAA team championships. NESCAC student-athletes claimed 24 individual national championships and NESCAC teams won seven national team championships.
